School Visits Are Blooming

The late fall and winter months have been filled with visits to our district's elementary classrooms. Grace Hand, microfarm coordinator, has met with over 330 kindergarten through fifth graders to present an introduction to agriculture and read a book about an ag related topic. Her spring schedule is already filled with more of these visits where new literature will be showcased in the classroom. Books that share a glimpse into the numerous categories and topics that make up agriculture are being collected. Book topics include animals, insects, composting, growing food, soil, machinery, food preparation, farmers markets, flowers, and so much more. The goal is to give the students an introduction into all of the different opportunities that await them and teach them about the daily necessities they rely upon.



Growing Teachers Through the Seasons Increases Teacher Creativity

Grace has spent the last few months continuing to integrate the OSU Extension program called *Growing Teachers Throughout the Seasons* (GTS) at area elementary schools.

She is hoping to expand their outdoor growing space next year and dreams of adding a vertical hydroponic tower to their school building in the future as well.

This month many of the teachers will be growing a dwarf tomato variety in their indoor hydroponic units and should be enjoying fresh cherry tomatoes by spring. They'll also seed leafy greens like lettuce, bok choy, and kale inside with the intention of later planting them into their outdoor growing space.

We're so glad that the teachers and students have been enjoying growing in their classrooms, and we hope to be able to offer this opportunity to more of the district teachers next school year.

Grace Hand to be Featured Speaker at Lectures on Tap


